



## **Order under Section 69 Residential Tenancies Act, 2006**

Maria Gaspar (the 'Landlord') applied for an order to terminate the tenancy and evict Kim You and Yun Sim You (the 'Tenants') because the Tenants did not pay the rent that the Tenant owes.

This application was heard by videoconference on March 14, 2023.

Only the Landlord's Legal Representative Simon Barta and the Landlord attended the hearing.

As of 10:15 a.m., the Tenants were not present or represented at the hearing although properly served with notice of this hearing by the LTB. There was no record of a request to adjourn the hearing. As a result, the hearing proceeded with only the Landlord's evidence.

### **Determinations:**

1. The Landlord served the Tenants with a valid Notice to End Tenancy Early for Nonpayment of Rent (N4 Notice). The Tenants did not void the notice by paying the amount of rent arrears owing by the termination date in the N4 Notice or before the date the application was filed.
2. As of the hearing date, the Tenants were still in possession of the rental unit.
3. The lawful rent is \$2,100.00. It is due on the 1st day of each month.
4. Based on the Monthly rent, the daily rent/compensation is \$69.04. This amount is calculated as follows: \$2,100.00 x 12, divided by 365 days.

5. The Tenants have not made any payments since the application was filed.
6. The rent arrears owing to March 31, 2023 are \$39,900.00.
7. The Landlord incurred costs of \$186.00 for filing the application and is entitled to reimbursement of those costs.
8. There is no last month's rent deposit.

Monetary jurisdiction

9. Section 207(1) of the Act provides that the Board cannot order a person to pay more than \$35,000.00.
10. The rent arrears owing to March 31, 2023 are \$39,900.00, which is in excess of the Board's monetary jurisdiction of \$35,000.00.
11. The Landlord's Legal Representative indicated a desire to proceed with the hearing of the application and was made aware that by proceeding with this application the Landlord's claim for rent arrears in excess of \$35,000.00 will be extinguished pursuant to section 207(3) of the Act.
12. This order terminates the tenancy and requires the Tenants to pay the rent arrears outstanding plus the cost of filing the application, and less the rent deposit being held by the Landlord. This amount, which the Tenants are being ordered to pay in accordance with subsection 74(3) of the Act, is subject to the Board's monetary jurisdiction of \$35,000.00.
13. The order also provides that the Tenants can choose to void the order in accordance with subsection 74(4) of the Act by paying the following amounts before the order is enforceable:
  - (a) the amount of rent that is in arrears under the tenancy agreement;
  - (b) the amount of additional rent that would have been due under the tenancy agreement as at the date of payment by the tenant had notice of termination not been given;
  - (c) the amount of NSF cheque charges charged by financial institutions to the landlord in respect of cheques tendered to the landlord by or on behalf of the tenant, as allowed by the Board in an application by the landlord under section 87;
  - (d) the amount of administration charges payable by the tenant for the NSF cheques, as allowed by the Board in an application by the landlord under section 87; and
  - (e) the costs ordered by the Board

14. The amount the Tenant must pay to void the order is over \$35,000.00. As the Tenants are not legally required to pay the amount necessary to void the order, I find that the monetary jurisdiction contained in section 207(1) of the Act does not apply to this portion of the order.

Relief from eviction

15. It was the Landlord's uncontested evidence that the Tenants did not respond to calls or emails regarding a possible repayment plan, although the Landlord was willing to provide "leeway" due to the pandemic.
16. I have considered all of the disclosed circumstances in accordance with subsection 83(2) of the *Residential Tenancies Act, 2006* (the 'Act'), including the impact of COVID-19 on the parties and whether the Landlord attempted to negotiate a repayment agreement with the Tenant and find that it would be unfair to grant relief from eviction pursuant to subsection 83(1) of the Act.

**It is ordered that:**

1. The tenancy between the Landlord and the Tenants is terminated unless the Tenants void this order.
2. **The Tenants may void this order and continue the tenancy by paying to the Landlord or to the LTB in trust:**
  - \$42,186.00 if the payment is made on or before April 17, 2023. See Schedule 1 for the calculation of the amount owing.
3. The Tenants may also make a motion at the LTB to void this order under section 74(11) of the Act, if the Tenants have paid the full amount owing as ordered plus any additional rent that became due after April 17, 2023 but before the Court Enforcement Office (Sheriff) enforces the eviction. The Tenants may only make this motion once during the tenancy.
4. **If the Tenants do not pay the amount required to void this order the Tenant must move out of the rental unit on or before April 17, 2023**
5. If the Tenants do not void the order, the Tenants shall pay to the Landlord \$35,000.00\*\*. This amount includes rent arrears owing up to the date of the hearing and the cost of filing the application. See Schedule 1 for the calculation of the amount owing.
6. The Tenants shall also pay the Landlord compensation of \$69.04 per day for the use of the unit starting March 15, 2023 until the date the Tenants move out of the unit.
7. If the Tenants does not pay the Landlord the full amount owing on or before April 17, 2023, the Tenants will start to owe interest. This will be simple interest calculated from April 18, 2023 at 6.00% annually on the balance outstanding.

8. If the unit is not vacated on or before April 17, 2023, then starting April 18, 2023, the Landlord may file this order with the Court Enforcement Office (Sheriff) so that the eviction may be enforced.
9. Upon receipt of this order, the Court Enforcement Office (Sheriff) is directed to give vacant possession of the unit to the Landlord on or after April 18, 2023.
